


Today and Tomorrow's Weather

A strong frontal system is currently moving through the western basin, driving a squall line over the northwestern region. Wind gusts in excess of 50 knots and possible waterspouts are accompanying this line which is expected to fluctuate in intensity and bring an elevated storm threat to parts of the northern basin through tomorrow morning. Winds will be very gusty out ahead of the front at 20-30 knots sustained out of the southeast with gusts to 40 knots over the central deepwaters. Winds will veer more southerly as the front approaches before a quick westerly shift occurs with the frontal passage. Rough seas of 7-10 feet (with up to 12 feet over the deepwaters) will likely continue both prior to and after the frontal passage. The front will clear the basin by mid to late morning tomorrow with gusty northwesterly winds and rough seas gradually improving from west to east through tomorrow evening.


Day Three through Seven Weather Hazards

High pressure moves in Friday bringing much more pleasant conditions to the basin. Winds will continue veering eventually out of the southeast by Sunday at moderate speeds. Seas will become slight this weekend and continue into Monday. Winds begin picking back up out of the southeast on Day 7 to fresh speeds with moderate seas building back in.


This Morning's Winds and Seas




This Evening's Winds and Seas




Tomorrow Morning's Winds and Seas




Tomorrow Evening's Winds and Seas




Day 3 Morning Winds and Seas




Day 3 Evening Wind and Seas




Day 1 Surface Chart



Day 2 Surface Chart




Day 3 Surface Chart
